Alayna created an interactive curriculum with engaging games and even a live online quiz to test girls on what they learned. The workshop also featured a speaker from the Lee's Summit Police Department to further educate participants.

To ensure everyone has access to safe social media practices, Alayna created an online toolkit for future troops to run their own Cybersecurity Badge workshops that can be used by troops across the region for years to come.

Simplifying the "Think like a Programmer" Journey

Gun Safety and Education

Aundrea was a girl member for 11 years in Troop 4024 in Service Unit 622. A graduate of Fort Osage High School, she now works at the Winchester Lake City Ammunition Plant.

Aundrea's project focuses on gun safety and education for all ages, aiming to help the community handle situations where they may unexpectedly find a firearm. She specifically worked on educating children who may not know what to do if they find a gun by reaching out to local Girl Scout and Boy Scout troops to attend her workshop. Working with local law enforcement, Aundrea split up into two groups for ages 4-12 and ages 13-65+. For children, her curriculum focused on "stop, don't touch, run, and tell a grown up." For the older group, four speakers provided insight on the different ways gun violence can impact people's lives, as well as explaining how to legally own, carry, and safely lock firearms away from others.

To continue this education in her community, Aundrea collected information from the law enforcement speakers and created a presentation that Scout leaders can use to educate future classes of scouts, maintaining a safe and educated community for years to come.

Heartfelt Healthcare

Tasneem Fatimah was a girl member for ten years in Troop 3113 in Service Unit 672. She is a freshman at Missouri Southern State University, where she attends a combined medical program with the Kansas City University School of Osteopathic Medicine.

Tasneem was inspired to address inequities in healthcare access for her Gold Award project. In an effort to help people who lack insurance or refugees and immigrants who may not understand the U.S. healthcare system, Tasneem organized a free health clinic with two local physicians at the Islamic Circle of North America (ICNA) Relief Food Pantry in Raytown, Missouri. Visitors to the clinic were able to receive basic medical monitoring (oxygen levels, heart rate, and blood pressure) and consult with a physician to receive advice. Tasneem also created pamphlets with information on free healthcare resources in the area and healthy lifestyle tips for illness prevention to continue to help her community.

Twelve patients visited the free clinic and rated their care an average of 4.75/5, reporting that while they struggled with healthcare access, Tasneem's project offered them important resources and information. Thanks to Tasneem, the ICNA Relief Food Pantry has a plan to continue offering this essential medical care to underserved populations.

Do You Wanna Build a Library?







Eliminating Plastic Waste One Step at a Time



When volunteering at the Islamic Center of Johnson County, Syeda noticed that there were no drinking fountains or water outdoors for when children went out to play. Therefore, many kids were using single-use plastic water bottles instead of refillable, reusable options. Syeda's project installed an outdoor water fountain with multiple spouts and a bottle filler attachment so that visitors had access to drinking water. Additionally, Syeda distributed reusable water bottles to all of the children that attended summer camp at the Islamic Center and helped the children decorate their bottles so that they would bring them back to camp, eliminating single use plastic waste.

Syeda's project meets an essential need for the community, but also encourages those who use the water fountain to live a more eco-friendly and environmentally conscious lifestyle. With easy access to refillable water, the amount of single use plastics at the Islamic Center of Johnson County will decrease, creating a less wasteful environment for the future.

For this project Sammie created a manual with valuable information on forming a 501c3, running a toy drive and other resources to empower others to start similar drives. In addition, the 501c3 she set-up – Sammie's Toy Drive – will continue to evolve, bring resources together and support survivors.

Plastic to Bedrolls





Grown Veggies on the Farm



Sensory Path/Mat



Happy Learning Kits: Addressing the Summer Slide




The book will continue to be available for children across the globe – even being offered in three languages! It is available online through Barnes & Noble and will continue to be a great resource for families and medical centers around the world.
